# Single market seen boosting ASEAN resilience vs supply chain disruptions by Justine Irish D. Tabile

HE Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) needs to make further progress in creating a single market if it is to remain resilient in the face of disruptions to global supply chains, the bloc's Secretary-General said.

Kao Kim Hourn, speaking at the 21st Management Association of the Philippines (MAP) International CEO Conference on Tuesday at Shangri-la The Fort, said economic downturns, political uncertainty, and a less predictable environmental concerns are combining to disrupt supply chains, in which Southeast Asia plays a key role.

"It is imperative that we expedite our concerted efforts to be more agile and more resilient and at the same time ensure sustainable and inclusive growth," he said.

He added that ASEAN needs to focus on making the region a vibrant, thriving, single market and a hub of production serving global supply chains.

"Achieving this goal necessitates the enhancement of partnerships over the last year and beyond," he said.

He added that such partnerships will allow member countries to form deep and important economic linkages from both in and outside of the region.

Upgrading trade agreements will keep them "future ready and responsive to emerging global and regional developments including those related to the digital, green and blue economies," Mr. Kao said.

Thailand Management Association (TMA) Chair Nithi Patarachoke said that ASEAN should harness its strategic location to drive future growth.

"(It is) near major economies like China, South Korea, Japan and India. At the same time ASEAN is experiencing an expanding middle class population which means more demand for consumption," Mr. Patarachoke said.

"ASEAN also enjoys extensive cross-border trade networks so, ASEAN is still viewed as a region of growth with high potential," he added.

Singapore International Chamber of Commerce (SICC) Chair Bicky Bhangu "said that the environment we're living in, the geopolitical tensions, the cost of doing business, inflation, (high) interest rates, supply chain disruptions, (are having) a significant impact on doing business."

Because of this, Mr. Bhangu said there is an opportunity for ASEAN countries to act collectively.

"The main point here really is that across ASEAN is a huge value chain of opportunities from raw materials, markets, technologies, processes, and from bringing all of that ASEAN capability together gives a much stronger comparative advantage against the geopolitical tensions that were in today," he said.

Philippine Chamber of Commerce and Industry President George T. Barcelon said that one of the key features of the Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership, which he said is an extension of the ASEAN, is to address the low levels of intra-region trade and investment, relative to the high levels of economic integration achieved by Europe.

"This is something that concerns us in the Philippines because in our trade among the ASEAN countries, we are on the deficit side," he added.

Mr. Barcelon also said ASEAN countries can

be more economically complementary by removing tariff barriers, improving logistics, and harmonized infrastructure standards.

MAP President Benedicta Du-Baladad said opportunities abound for agile CEOs in the geopolitical shifts.

"Even as alliances are shifting, the bottom line will always be recovery and growth and these two are shared goals across the globe," Ms. Du-Baladad said.

"These can potentially usher in greater regional cooperation and fan the flames for innovative and out-of-the-box ideas so that we can all thrive in this post pandemic world," she added.

The MAP, SICC and TMA signed a two-year memorandum of partnership and cooperation (MPC) at the event.

The MPC calls for the parties to form a technical working group to "study the possibility and feasibility of establishing an ASEAN Management Organization to expand the scope of the MPC and pursue other areas of cooperation."

Ms. Du-Baladad said that forming a management association within ASEAN is "one way of fostering collaboration, cooperation and sharing of best practices in management."

# Asean chief highlights need for partnerships

NHANCING strategic partnerships within and beyond the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (Asean) and maximizing free trade agreements (FTAs) are necessary to strengthen global supply chains, Asean's secretary-general said on Tuesday.

In a speech during the Management Association of the Philippines' 21st International CEO Conference in Bonifacio Global City on Tuesday,

Kao Kim Hourn underscored the significance of enhancing multilateral ties in response to constraints brought by geopolitical tensions and environmental concerns.

"Despite positive achievements, Asean recognizes that complacency has no room. The war today is witnessing economic downturns because of tensions and environmental concerns, which have disrupted supply chains," he said.

"It is imperative that we expedite our concerted efforts to be more agile and more resilient, and at the same time, ensure sustainable and inclusive growth...," Hourn added.

Partnerships "not just within Asean, but beyond," he continued, would allow the region to "maintain close friends and close relationships with a multitude of partners and friends as well as creating a conducive environment for business, foster partnerships and trade relationships with numerous entities."

Hourn noted that the regional organization was focused on cooperation, collaboration, nonconfrontation and nonconflict. In addition to building on harmony and harmonization, Asean is also looking to promote more open trade and investments.

With the world slowly recovering from the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic, he said FTAs would give "local investors and business communities the confidence to extend and expand their operation in the Asean market, which will further translate into increased employment opportunities."

"In order to thrive in distribution, a large amount of integration among Asean would be categorized as strong partnerships, developing while innovating and taking an inclusive approach that prioritizes people," Hourn added.

The Asean chief also called on business leaders to promote diversity, equity and accessibility as investors consider these in making investment and trade decisions.

The adoption of inclusive business models, he added, would promote meaningful relationships with customers and build sustainable brands.

# MAP spearheads Partnership and Cooperation with other management organizations in the ASEAN region

Being the leading management organization in the country, the Management Association of the Philippines (MAP) spearheaded the recent landmark Memorandum of Partnership and Cooperation (MPC) which was signed by the MAP, the Singapore International Chamber of Commerce (SICC) and the Thailand Management Association (TMA) during the 21<sup>st</sup> MAP International CEO Conference last September 12, 2023.

Representing the three big management organizations were MAP President Benedicta Du-Baladad, SICC Chair Bicky Bhangu and TMA President Nithi Patarachoke. This momentous signing was witnessed by the ASEAN Secretary-General Dr. Kao Kim Hourn who delivered the keynote during the Conference, Mr. George Barcelon, one of the Philippines representatives to the ASEAN Business Advisory Council (ABAC), and Ambassador Tull Traisorat of Thailand.

The MPC seeks to deepen business linkages within the region and assure its active cooperation in the goal towards ASEAN centrality, described as "the primary driving force in its relations and cooperation with its external partners." The partnership aims to pursue mutually beneficial partnerships within the region through sharing of best management practices, undertaking education, information activities and training programs that can enhance knowledge and skills of management practitioners and future leaders, and advocate for reforms that will improve the ease of doing business in the ASEAN region.

"The future of integration in ASEAN should be characterized by strong partnerships, development driven by innovation, as well as an inclusive approach that gives priority to the people," Secretary-General of ASEAN Dr.s Kao Kim Hourn emphasized in his keynote speech.

The partnership initiated by MAP can potentially open the gateway for exploring direct business opportunities among companies in the region and take advantage of the benefits of trade liberalization. Since the members of each of these organizations are already known, it can shorten the process of looking for partners and directly engaging those already involved in the industries of interest.

"The bottom line is recovery and growth – and these two are shared goals that can transcend shifting alliances. By enabling these linkages at the business and industry level, we can bypass the bureaucratic impediments and go straight to building partnerships and forging long-term relationships.", MAP President Baladad explained.

The three convenors hope to expand the alliance to their counterparts in the ASEAN region and together help promote greater regional cooperation and joint undertakings that will help the players thrive in the post-pandemic world.
